North America

- Wooden club, probably Iroquois, late 18th century style.
- 30 Smoking 'tomahawk' pipe, obtained before 1837. The steel head was made in England and traded with the peoples of the Northern Woodlands area.
- Moccasins made of caribou skin with beadwork designs. Probably Algonkin type made in the early 19th century.
- 32 Snowshoes from eastern Canada, early 20th century.

The Woodlands

- 33 Sash from the Eastern Woodlands area, made by finger weaving probably in the late 18th century.
- 34 Knee band from the Eastern Woodlands area, made by finger weaving in the late 18th century.
- Pair of garter pendants, made by finger weaving. From the Eastern Great Lakes area, late 18th century type.
- Knee band from the Eastern Woodlands area, made by finger weaving, late 18th century.
- Bag with bead work designs, from the Eastern Woodlands area, made before 1838.

North Atlantic Coastal groups

- Cloth hood with beadwork embroidery, worn by women. Probably made by the Penobscot or Maliseet people in the early 19th century.
- Model canoe made of painted bark, from the Micmac people of Nova Scotia, made before 1844.
- Moccasins with beaded designs, made by the Micmac people before 1845.

The League of the Iroquois

- Moccasins with beaded designs, and a separate leather sole. Mohawk or Abenaki type, made before 1845.
- Sash, made by finger weaving, probably by the Iroquois or Algonkin people in the late 18th century.
- 43 Bag with beaded designs, Iroquois or Abenaki type. Probably made for sale to tourists in the Niagara Falls area in the late 19th century.

Wampum

44 String of purple wampum shell beads. Probably from the Eastern Great Lakes area, made before 1837.

- Belt of white and purple wampum, probably from the Eastern Great Lakes area, made before 1837.
- Chest and back ornament, made of wampum with a shell disc, glass beads, quill-work and metal cones. From the Eastern Woodlands area, late 18th century type.

Huron People

- 47 Moccasins decorated with moose hair.
 Probably made by the Huron people in the late 18th century style.
- 48 Moccasin with quill-work designs.

 Probably made by the Huron people in the late 18th century.

Ojibwa People

- Moccasins with moose-hair embroidery designs. Probably made by the Ojibwa people, possibly in the late 18th century.
- Sash, made by the Ojibwa people in the early 19th century.
- Skin pouch with a beadwork panel, probably made by the Ojibwa or Métis people before 1838.
- 52 Bandoleer bag made of cloth with beaded panels made before 1860. Said to have belonged

to an Ojibwa chief called 'Wah bah naquod' of the White Earth reservation, Minnesota.

Cree People

- Pair of moccasins with silk embroidery made by the Cree people before 1840.
- Bag with beaded designs, probably made by the Ojibwa or Cree people, late 19th century style.
- Red cloth belt with quill-work designs and leather tassels. Probably made by the Cree people before 1838.
- Skin pouch with quill-work panels. Probably made by the Cree or North Athabascan people, early 19th century type.

Métis People

57 Buckskin coat with fur cuffs and collar, quill-work on the shoulders and painted designs. Made by the Métis in the early 19th century.

Native People of the Plains

- Quiver and arrow, from the northern Plains area.
- 59 Smoking pipe made of catlinite with a wood mouth-piece, used on important ceremonial occasions. Made by the Dakota (Sioux) people

in the early 19th century. Catlinite is a soft red siltstone, found in south-western Minnesota.

- Padded skin saddle, stirrups and crupper decorated with quill-work embroidery, made before 1835. Formerly belonged to the Teton Dakota warrior who owned the buffalo-skin shirt hanging in the opposite case.
- Moccasins with beadwork designs, possibly made by the Crow people in the late 19th century.
- Moccasins with beadwork designs, made by the Teton Dakota (Sioux) people in the late 19th or early 20th century.

Decoration

- Necklace made of silver with crescents and squash blossoms, which are an emblem of fertility. Made by the Navaho people in the late 19th century.
- Knife sheath with quill-work designs and glass beads, from the Eastern Plains area, early 19th century type.
- Knife sheath with quill-work and quill-wrapped tassels from the Eastern Plains area, early 19th century type.
- Watch-holder with quill-work designs.

Made by the Plains Cree or Plains Ojibwa people in the mid 19th century, probably for trade with Europeans.

- 69 Moccasins with quill-work panels.
 Probably made by the Huron people in the late 18th century.
- Moccasins with moose-hair embroidery.
 Loretteville Huron type, early 19th century.
- Needle case with moose-hair designs, from the Eastern Woodlands area, made in the mid 19th century.
- 72 Circular box and lid made of birch-bark with moose-hair designs. From the Eastern Woodlands area, made before 1880.
- 73 Box made of birch-bark with designs in sweetgrass. Made for the tourist trade at Niagara Falls in the late 19th century.
- Awl-case with beadwork decoration. Made before 1893 by a woman from the Piegan Blackfoot people in the Fort Benton area, Montana. It contained a bodkin used in wiping sweat from the body.
- Moccasins with beadwork designs, made by the Micmac or Maliseet people before 1845.
- Moccasins with silk embroidery designs, made by the Athabascan or Cree people in the late 19th century.

77 Box made of birch-bark, made in Quebec province before 1841.
